A Trauma-Informed Lens for Intergenerational Theatre-Making

Our workshop space and curriculum empowers queer and trans youth to lead and to thrive, making art through community and community through art. Through training and personal experience, we have developed a queer trauma-informed pedagogy, and applied principles of this model to an ongoing workshop for grades 7-12. This workshop model uses writing, improv and movement activities as well as techniques for devised theatre and playwriting. Our model also emphasizes historical context and bringing in guest artists to share their perspectives and skills. From this workshop you will walk away with activities, tools, and ideas to apply this pedagogy & programming to other theater and youth-work settings. We will present excerpts of original youth-written plays, a basic framework in the theory and science of trauma, and facilitate a discussion on our role as leaders and facilitators in an uncertain world.

Theater as a Tool for HIV Prevention in LGBTQ Youth

This informational discussion will share about a collaboration between The Theater Offensive and Boston Children's Hospital to create a HIV Prevention workshop targeted towards LGBTQ Youth using interactive theater techniques. Lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, and questioning (LGBTQ) youth are at a disproportionately higher risk of contracting HIV and other sexually transmitted infections than their heterosexual and cisgender peers (particularly youth of color). We will explore how peer-led, arts-based prevention strategies may be effective for sensitive health topics, such as HIV risk, because they engage participants in the emotional and cultural aspects of health promotion in a way that may be more intimately relatable than scientific fact-based discussions alone. Participants in this session will learn about the unique partnership between an arts organization and a premier children's medical institute, the HIV workshop creation and implementation with and for youth, and research findings. Participants should be open to discussion about sex and sexual acts as it relates to sexual health and behavior, especially in terms and vocabulary used by youth.

Last year, Project Pride and Pride Players explored how we can collaborate artistically when we are in different cities. Brian and Amanda will share their successes, failures, challenges and surprises from the last three years. For 2016-17, we would like to invite other PYTA theaters to join us in the collaboration as we find ways for our youth to connect meaningfully during the year. He grew up in a Cuban-American family in Florida where he earned his BA in Theatre from Rollins College and an MFA in Theatre for Young Audiences from the University of Central Florida. At TTO, Nick helps to brainstorm, develop, and implement all OUT in Your Neighborhood programs. In particular he focuses on True Colors where he is the lead artist collaborating with LGBTQA youth to create original works of theatre. Nick is a Board Member of the American Alliance of Theatre and Education (AATE) and a member of the PYTA Executive Committee.

Avery Blanton, Playhouse on the Square

Avery Blanton is a Memphis native and graduated from St. Mary's Episcopal school this past May. They are attending Columbia College Chicago in the fall and will be majoring in musical theater with a minor in voice acting. Avery has been known for work on and off the stage, and even has a special interest in special effect makeup and choreography. Avery hopes to go on to do as much in theater (as well as queer theater) as they can, and looks forward to gleaning as much information from this and future events as possible.

Evelyn Francis, The Theater Offensive

Evelyn Francis (Director of Programs) an innovative theatre artist, educator and administrator with experience working directly with over 10 Boston area arts organizations. Evelyn's M.A. in Theatre Education from Emerson College culminated in a thesis, which examined the effects of devised work in the lives of LGBT youth. Evelyn joined The Theater Offensive as the lead teaching artist for True Colors: Out Youth Theater in 2001. As a result of her work with the program, True Colors was designated the 2008 Social Innovator for Empowering Youth through the Arts by the Social Innovation Forum. In 2006, she became the Director of Education and in 2010 she was promoted to her current position as Director of Programs. Evelyn now oversees and implements all elements of The Theater Offensive's OUT in Your Neighborhood strategy. She produces the full season of neighborhood productions including World Premieres and New England Premiers, which are accompanied by community activities. Evelyn stays connected to True Colors as the Director of the Summer Troupe and Adult Advisor of the Leadership and Inclusion Council. She oversees the development of the True Colors Creative Action Crew and True Colors Studio. In 2010, she became the co-chair of the executive committee of the Pride Youth Theater Alliance. She has also facilitated workshops at the following conferences: PYTA, AATE, Creating Change, GLSEN, National Guild for Community Arts Education, the Boston Trans* Youth Summit, the Connecticut True Colors Conference. At home in Boston, Evelyn loves meeting with youth artists or national artists and making jewelry in her albeit limited spare time.

Brian Guhring, Omaha Theater Company

Brian Guehring is the co-founder and co-director of the award winning Pride Players. Now in its 18th season, Pride Players has been honored by National Education Association and American Alliance for Theater and Education among other. He is the award-winning Playwright in Residence of the Omaha Theater Company for Young People and the Education Director of the Omaha Theater Company. They studied Trauma Awareness at the Institute for Family Professionals in Philadelphia. Their plays have been seen at the Huntington Theatre, New York Theater Workshop, the New Museum, Clubbed Thumb, New Georges, Page73, Colt Coeur, Yale School of Drama, Lark Play Development Center, Bay Area Playwrights Festival, Aurora Theater, Crowded Fire, Fresh Ink Theatre, New Harmony Project and performed in Russian in Moscow. MJ is currently a member of the Public Theater's Emerging Writers' Group, WP Theater Lab and a core playwright at InterAct Theatre.

Amanda Kibler, The Coterie

Amanda Kibler is the Education Director at The Coterie Theatre in Kansas City, MO and founder of Project Pride. She earned her M.F.A. in theatre for young audiences from the University of Central Florida. Before joining The Coterie, she worked as an actor, director, and teaching artist at the Omaha Theater Company in Omaha, NE, Orlando Repertory Theatre in Orlando, FL, and Visible Fictions in Glasgow, Scotland. Seeing the impact that creating theatre has on the lives of youth, she began Project Pride within a year of beginning at The Coterie to provide youth in KC a platform for their voices. She loves creating theatre for and with youth of all ages.

Thomas Medina-Castrejón, Philadelphia Young Playwrights

Tom born in Paris, France in 1998 to French and Mexican parents. When Tom was 1, the family moved to the US, where they discovered homeschooling. Tom now identifies as an unschooler. Tom has had a great love for animals since very young, and has raised two working dogs. He is fascinated by animal-communication. Tom has participated in several acting opportunities over the years, from being a teddy bear in a homeschool co-op's play, to performing in Shakespeare's "Merry Wives of Windsor". Tom also enjoys writing and has participated in 3 NaNoWriMos. Tom recently began exploring what being Latino meant to him as well as being a white-passing mestizo. This, along with him being gay and trans, prompted him to learn as much as he could about social justice issues and oppressive structures. He aims to incorporate that knowledge in his writing.

Sidney Monroe, The Theater Offensive

Sidney joins the stellar TTO staff as the Youth Programs Manager. His introduction to TTO came through a chance encounter at the 2012 Creating Change conference. As an Arkansas native, Sidney taught Theatre & Speech Communications at Episcopal Collegiate School and worked for the Arkansas Repertory Theatre. His current work merges Applied Drama & Theatre techniques with LGBTQA youth ensembles. One of his favorite workshops to teach is Hip-Hop Theatre because of the fusion between multidisciplinary arts and culture. In his spare time, he enjoys the occasional jazz dance class or seasonal ale. Sidney holds a BA in International Relations from Hendrix College and a MFA in Drama and Theatre for Youth & Communities from The University of Texas at Austin. Sidney's spirit animal is the elephant.

MR Stine, Philadelphia Young Playwrights

Maryruth (Mr) Stine is a performer and educator raised in Elmwood, <u>W.VA</u> and Baltimore MD. Their principal focus is community-driven projects combining elements of commedia dell'arte and puppetry to strike a balance of silly stories and social critique. Love to all collaborators, special shout-outs to trailblazers Marapacchi (Chennai), LesBit (Bangalore), Lost and Found (Vancouver), Teen Sleuth and the Freed Cyborg Choir (Montreal), Lady Gaza (MTL/Lethbridge)! Mr is a resident teaching artist and co-founder of the Queer Theatre Workshop at Philadelphia Young Playwrights, creating original theatre through a youth empowerment lens since 1987.

Abe Rybeck, The Theater Offensive

Abe Rybeck is the founder and Executive Artistic Director of The Theater Offensive: OUT in Your Neighborhood. He also serves as Chair for the Board of the National Performance Network. His main work now is uniting artists, neighbors, community groups and local businesses to collaborate on OUT performance work in the Boston neighborhoods of Roxbury, Dorchester, Jamaica Plain and the South End. Programs Abe founded include True Colors: Out Youth Theater, which helps LGBT and allied youth create autobiographical shows for schools and community groups; A Street Theater Named Desire, an AIDS-activist guerrilla theater troupe performing in gay cruising areas; Come As You Are, a national performance series to celebrate the 40th anniversary of the Stonewall Uprising; the band Adult Children of Heterosexuals, for which he was lead singer; and the OUT on the Edge Queer Theater Festival. Collaborating across cultures, genders and generations to create performance work is Abe's favorite part of his job. He won the 2007 Jonathan Larson Award for musical theater for his collaboration on the book of True Colors alumna Melissa Li's Surviving the Nian. Abe's other plays include Bombshell, about actress Judy Holliday's relationship with her female NYPD lover in the mid-century Greenwich Village scene; Dirt, a domestic comedy about insider gay politics and housecleaning; and Immaculate Infection, co-written with Brenda Cotto Escalera and Noelia Ortiz Cortés. His musicals include the hit Pure PolyESTHER: a biblical burlesque, which re-tells the biblical Book of Esther as a coming out story, Blame It on the Big Banana, about a troupe of drag queens during the Sandinista revolution; and the musical revue An Evening of Rachel Tension Among Friends. His solo performances include This is Not a Test, a burlesque show about AIDS; and Breaking the Dress Codes. He was declared one of the "Heeb 100" progressive Jewish world cultural leaders. He is proud to have received several awards from his peers in the community, especially the title of "Honorary Drum Majorette" from South End Dynamite, a Latina girls twirling squad.
